Bill (and Anne) Troup Founder of the Milford Food Bank

THE HISTORY

"Five items, five pantries, and the Lord," is how Bill Troup, the food bank founder, describes the beginning days. It was brought to his attention that Wolcott, a food bank near Monticello, IN, had soap that he could get access to, and God told him that it was time to get started with a food bank in Milford. Wolcott was happy to help him with his first trailer load, but a few weeks later when the need arose for more supplies, they were originally reluctant to furnish him with more. Bill persisted and they did eventually give in to his plea. That was the start of a tremendous working relationship.

Bill recalls several highlights as the food bank continued to grow. The trailer needed to be loaded and unloaded by hand, which they did alongside some of the first supporters of the Milford Food Bank, Ray and Paula Haab. Because there was no refrigeration storage at Milford, all their frozen and cooled foods were taken to Shipshewanna for refrigeration.

Another early supporter, Dennis Wuthrich, joined forces as a truck/trailer driver when time allowed. Some of the locations of food pickup were in Indianapolis and Chicago. Bimbo Bakeries was a regular supplier of bread. On one occasion they had 800 loaves of bread and not enough room to transport it. A little squeezing and squashing got it all in the truck and trailer. Once he remembered buying 7,000 boxes of cereal from E&S Sales in Shipshewanna, for five cents a box. Bill Doege also became an early volunteer with the work of the food bank. Bill is presently the Operation Manager of the food bank.

Some of the food bank's early focuses consisted of the bank, the library, nursing home and school teachers. Tomato juice and bread were daily replenished at the library. The nursing home was the recipient of lots of bread. Bill and Anne recall a Bible verse put into every bag of food that was passed or set out.


The food bank has always depended on donations to operate. Bill's policy was, that if it's of the Lord, it couldn't be stopped. The Milford Food Bank's Board of Directors wish to build on the legacy that Bill and Anne Troup have begun with the Milford Food Bank. One of trust in God to keep supplying our needs through gracious donors, of continuing to share the Word of God and one of sharing physical food to those in need.

OUR STORY

The Milford Food Bank had a meager beginning in 2010 serving just five local pantries with a borrowed trailer, forklift, building and a handful of volunteers. With open hearts and a lot of faith, the food bank steadily grew.

In 2012 Milford Food Bank operations moved to the warehouse of The Papers, Inc. From this location we served 50 pantries in 12 counties in northern Indiana and southern Michigan. The food bank was abundantly blessed in 2017 with the donation of a 5000 sq. ft. building around the corner from The Papers. Since then, we have continued to use warehouse space in The Papers, but our operations and distributions all occur at our location on James St.

Today Milford Food Bank serves around 174 different organizations. We work with food pantries, soup kitchens, recovery homes and school backpack programs. We distribute over 350,000 pounds of food a month.

OUR PLAN

Milford Food Bank has been gifted property directly across the street to expand into. Our current proposal will allow for an additional 12,000 sq ft of warehouse and processing space. Being across the road makes inventory management and distribution simpler and more efficient.

Our goal is to be able to double the distribution of product to our partners. We currently distribute over 350,000 pounds of food a month. We hope that this expansion and the efficiencies it provides will allow us to distribute up to 700,000 pounds of food a month. Doing this we might be able to touch the lives of nearly 100,000 individuals throughout our communities.

To make this building a reality we will need to raise \$1,000,000. This includes the construction of the building as well as finishing an updated processing area for bulk foods, a new indoor refrigeration/freezer section and loading docks.
